Total Score: 805 Points (with a minimum of 205 points)

Total Testing Time:

- 2 hours and 15 minutes
- 3 Sections, 45 minutes each

Adaptive?: The GMAT Focus Edition *is* adaptive.

- The difficulty level of the content **does** change based on performance as the test taker progresses through the exam. This is true of all 3 sections.

Sections and Timing:

Scoring Details:

- The reported score is a scaled score out of **805 points**
 - Points are gained for correct answers.
 - Points are lost for incorrect answers.
 - Omitted questions result in higher score reductions than answering the questions incorrectly.
- The three (3) multiple choice sections are given a *raw score* based on how many questions are answered correctly, incorrectly, and the streaks of those sets (for example, answering multiple questions in a row correctly boosts the score more than if the same number of questions are answered correctly spread out throughout the section).
 - The baseline score, assuming no correct answers, is 205 points.
 - Each question, based on its adaptive difficulty, is assigned a value of 1-8 in terms of how difficult the question is (8 is the hardest). This information is not available before, during, or after the exam. After being multiplied by a set value per section based on performance, this produces the scaled score.
- The *GMAT Focus Edition score* is then found by combining the scores of these three scaled scores.
 - This is done on a scale out of 805, meaning there is a maximum of 600 points to be gained throughout the exam.

Calculator Policy: Calculators are allowed only during the Data Insights Section.

- Calculators will be provided, you should **not** bring your own.
- The calculator will look something like this, and will only be able to perform basic functions:

Experimental Questions: There is a possibility for experimental questions.

- Any questions that fall under this category **are not counted toward the student's score**, though it does provide the test makers data about potential future test questions.
- When it shows up on the GMAT Focus Edition (which is not every single test), the experimental questions will appear in the mix of other questions and will not be marked as such.
- It is not yet clear what percentage of questions on the new exam will be experimental and therefore not graded. However, for context, it is known that about 15% of the questions on the previous GMAT exam format (pre Feb 1, 2024) were experimental.
- Since scored questions and experimental questions are indistinguishable from one another, students should take care to answer each question as though it counts towards their score.

FAQs:

- **How often can a person take the test?**
 - A single test-taker will be allotted five (5) GMAT Focus Edition exam attempts during a 12-month period from the date of their exam, after which that 12-month period will reset and remain dormant until the test-taker's next attempt.

- You will be able to take the GMAT Focus Edition eight (8) times total, or over a lifetime.
- **How long does it take to get the scores back?** 7-21 business days
 - The test-taker will receive a notification on their mba.com account when scores are ready. Normally, students will receive their scores within 7 business days, but during busy seasons, it may take up to 21 days.
 - Test-takers will have 48 hours after receiving their scores to send them to up to five (5) schools free of charge through their mba.com account. If the test-taker already knows which schools they wish to apply to, they can also opt to submit scores during their exam session.
- **How long are scores valid?** Five years from the exam date.
